All Livestock 4-H and FFA members have to participate in a YQCA program before being allowed to show at 4-H events this year.

Instructor-Led classes are scheduled at the Extension office (7001 W 21st St N Wichita, KS 67205) at 7:00 PM on January 14th, February 11th, or March 11th. You only need to attend one class. The cost for the instructor-led class is \$3.00.

HOW TO SET GOALS FOR PROJECT BOOKS

Identify the project you are setting goals for

- Think about what you want to learn or accomplish through this project. Are you interested in improving a particular skill, such as photography techniques, animal care, or environmental sustainability?
- Reflect on your previous experiences and how you want to build on them.

Set SMART Goals

A SMART goal is one that is:

- **S**pecific: Clearly define what you want to achieve. Example: "I want to improve my gardening skills by planting a vegetable garden."
- **M**easurable: Make sure you can track your progress. Example: "I will track the growth of five different types of vegetables."
- Achievable: Set realistic goals based on your current abilities and resources. Example: "I will spend 30 minutes a week on watering and weeding the garden."
- **R**elevant: Ensure that your goal aligns with the objectives of the 4-H project and your personal interests. Example: "Growing a garden will help me learn about sustainability and food production."
- Time-bound: Set a deadline for when you want to achieve the goal. Example: "I will have my garden fully planted by the end of April."

Break Down Big Goals into Smaller Steps

- If your goal is broad (e.g., improving your photography skills), break it down into smaller, manageable steps. For example:
 - Week 1: Learn about lighting techniques.
 - Week 2: Practice shooting photos in different lighting conditions.
 - Week 3: Review and improve your composition.
 - Week 4: Submit your best work for feedback.

Reflect on the Learning Process

- As you work on your project, periodically reflect on your progress. Are you meeting your goals? If not, consider adjusting them to make them more achievable or relevant.
- Use the project book to track accomplishments and notes, which will also help in completing the book and presenting your final project.
- By using these steps, you can set clear, achievable goals that will help guide you through your 4-H project, ensuring a rewarding and educational experience.

How to get friends to join 4-H can be a fun and rewarding process! Here are some ideas to help you encourage your friends to become involved:

1. Share Your Experience

- Talk About What You Enjoy: Share your personal experiences and what you love about 4-H. Whether it's learning new skills, working on a fun project, or making new friends, explaining what makes 4-H enjoyable can inspire your friends to try it out.
- **Highlight Specific Projects:** Talk about the variety of 4-H projects available. Whether your friends are into animals, gardening, robotics, or photography, there's likely something that matches their interests.

2. Invite Them to Attend a Meeting or Event

- Bring Them Along: Invite your friends to come with you to a 4-H club meeting, an event, or a county fair. Let them see first-hand how fun and educational 4-H activities can be.
- Introduce Them to Members: Introduce your friends to other 4-H members and leaders. Sometimes the chance to meet new people can be the best way to spark their interest.

3. Explain the Benefits of 4-H

- Skill Development: Highlight the skills your friends can gain, such as leadership, public speaking, teamwork, and problem-solving.
- Community Engagement: Emphasize how 4-H is about giving back to the community through service projects and supporting local events.
- Opportunities for Fun and Travel: Mention any special events, fairs, and opportunities to compete in county or state-wide competitions.

4. Make It Social

- **Group Activities:** Suggest getting involved with 4-H as a group activity. Sometimes the idea of joining an organization is more appealing when friends can participate together.
- Collaborate on a Project: Ask your friends if they would be interested in doing a specific project with you, such as creating a garden or taking part in a science or animal project.

5. Use Social Media

- Share Your 4-H Journey: Post pictures and updates about your 4-H activities on your social media accounts. Highlight achievements, exciting events, or the fun of the projects you're involved in.
- Tag or Mention Friends: Encourage friends to check it out by tagging them or mentioning them in your posts. This can spark their curiosity and get them interested.
- By showing your enthusiasm for 4-H and giving your friends a glimpse of the opportunities it offers, you can help them see how fun and beneficial it can be to get involved!
