### PAXTON'S BLESSING BOX

Maggie Ballard and Paxton Burns are a mother and son team that started Paxton's Blessing Box in our own Wichita Community- but have grown to serve communities across the United States. In 2016 the pair built their first "Blessing Box" and placed it in their front yard in Riverside. The goal was to provide free access to food and hygiene products though the donation stocked crimson red boxes.

Fast forward to 2021, there are currently 80 Blessing Boxes scattered throughout the Wichita area, Kansas towns, and other states! Maggie and Paxton's goal continues to be adding new PBB locations across the United States. All that is needed it the same passion and love to help feed those in need, via sponsorship of a Blessing Box

Q: What is your non-profit?

A: Paxton's Blessing Box

#### Q: What moved you to begin the work your charity does?

**A:** As a young girl in the early 90's my parents owned an Antique Store called M. Ballard and Co. It was attached to the Eaton Hotel. I used to get bored out of my mind and start wandering around the bottom floor of the hotel. I made buddies with the Elevator Man, his name was Pork Chop. I usually sat at the table with all the grumpy old men and listened to them talk. I have always been a good listener and very observant. I would buy the table a round with the quarter machine that provided black coffee, chicken broth ( a persona fav LOL) or hot chocolate. I learned a few things that I didn't even realize at the time.

One must never judge a book by its cover. These gentleman had stories for days and usually were delighted to have someone to listen. Sometimes I had all the questions other times I just sat there. Everyone was so friendly. I also learned that not everyone was as fortunate as my family. They would chain smoke, talk, drink more coffee and repeat the process. The park across the street was already feeding people on the weekends...I would watch from the Eaton windows in the freezing cold and watch the recipients devour that hot meal....Ever since those early days I have been interested in service work and wanting to make my mark pushing for change. Mental health was huge factor, although I didn't know that at the time. My parents used to find work for some of the gentleman or buy them lunch usually from the Old Mill Tasty Shop.....When I learned I was pregnant I knew this was something that I wanted to pass on to Paxton. To teach him to be kind and not to judge.

#### Q: What impact have you seen within the community directly from your work?

**A**: Seeing someone first hand stand at the box and pop the top on a can of fruit or soup and literally drink it straight from the can is something that is difficult to describe. Seeing a fmaily walk up to the box with a toddler in the snow on foot, no car and rip open a bag of bagels while you are about to sit down at Christmas Dinner is heartwarming and wrinching all at the same time. Sseing the need, having more hosts reach out and seeing the community hlep make our food drives successful is amazing....the program has opened eyes to food insecurity, even to myself that there really is an issue....some people just don't know...but now they do!

#### Q: <u>How can 4-Hers get involved/support your charity?</u>

**A:** We would love to do something/collaborate with 4-H. whether they host a food drive, have a blessing box build work shop, and come volunteer at the warehouse, paint? We are open to anything!

### **Q:** What advice do you have for youth in the community looking to be involved with community service projects?

#### Horse Identification and Horseless Horse Certificates

All Horse Identification Certificates and Horseless Horse Certificates are due to the Extension office by 5 p.m. on Friday, April 30 because May 1 falls on a Saturday this year. Appropriate forms can be found at <u>https://www.sedgwick.k-state.edu/4-h-youth/project-resources/horse.html</u>

#### \*\*Please note

that the Horse ID Certificate was updated last year and this form (dated January 2020) must be used. Also posted on the website above is an example of a correctly filled out Horse ID Certificate; it must only be one page (front and back).

4-H Horse Snaffle Bit Project Nominations - Horse snaffle bit project nominations are also due to the Extension office by 5 p.m. on Friday, April 30 since May 1 falls on a Saturday this year.

Along with the nomination, a Horse Identification Certificate and a \$10 fee must be submitted.

#### KS Junior Livestock Show & KS State Fair Livestock Nominations

4-H members planning on showing their animals at the Kansas Junior Livestock Show (KJLS) and/or the Kansas State Fair must submit nominations to the Youth Livestock office. Market Beef nominations are due by May 1. \*\*NOTE: Please plan ahead as May 1 is a Saturday this year, so all forms will need to be signed no later than Friday, April 30. 
