WHAT DOES A PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE MEMBER DO?

Purpose

Program Development Committee (PDC) members work together with extensionagents to develop local programming.

Responsibilities

Working with agents, PDC members understand and promote the mission of K-StateResearch and Extension and serve their communities by completing the following tasks:

- Assess needs and issues of agricultural producers, communities, families, and youth.
- Identify new local audiences and develop a proactive plan to expand the scope of extension programming.
- Use K-State Research and Extension resources to meet local programming needs.
- Develop program action plans to address community needs and submit those plansto the extension board and area director for review and approval.
- Implement, participate in, and evaluate extension programs.
- Promote K-State Research and Extension program successes and impacts.

Qualifications

- At least 18 years old and a resident of the county in which the PDC is represented.
- Interested in working within the philosophy and mission of K-State Research andExtension.
- Willing to work closely with the local extension agent and other members of thePDC.
- Sincere interest in improving the quality of life for community residents.

Time Required

A PDC member serves a two-year term and are expected to participate in PDCmeetings scheduled throughout the year.

LAWANDA DESHAZER



I am currently am employed by the Greater Wichita YMCA, and I serve as the Senior Program Director for the Wichita Collective Impact (program). The goal of the program is to increase equity in 67214 zip code by transforming education and workforce development. Education enhancement overreaching goal is to help achieve third grade reading levels by the third grade. I am charged with helping to provide resources that will remove barriers, in the hopes that parents can focus on being able to help their children be successful. As a long time resident of Wichita, I was always familiar with the Extensions Office, but this summer I had the pleasure of working directly with Extensions. I organized a summer program in which we gave students a jump start on traditional learning and exposed them to non-traditional learning as well. The Extension office provide an opportunity for kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grade students to be exposed to beginning coding. The program was amazing and youth enjoyed it tremendously. And although it was not provided by the extensions office, our youth were also exposed to horticulture and I know that moving forward we can get those skills from Extensions.

What are your experiences with adult and/or youth educational programs, including those provided by K-State Research and Extension?

I have extensive experience working with youth and adult. I have served as the Advisor for the NAACP Youth Council for six years. During that time, the youth have gone to City Council meetings, and to the State Capital. They have learned how to effectively advocate on behalf of issues they deem important; they have held voter registration drives and were able to articulate the importance of voting. I have served as the Cheer Director for the local team, The Wichita Golden Bulldogs. With the girls, we have taught them to be ladies first and cheerleaders second. We emphasize hygiene, table manners, appearance, language skills, anger management... anything we think that will help them be productive citizens. I have mentored at the middle school level, at Hadley elementary I visited the school twice a week, checked grades, talked through any issues and met with teachers if there was a case in which we were having issues. With my current job, I will be working more with adults, providing parenting classes, ESOL, and technology classes.

What goals do you envision for Extension?

With the experience that I just had with Extensions, it is painfully clear that there is a segment of the population that is not familiar with all the programs that Extensions offer. I hope that we can find avenues to expose these programs to that population. We know that food desserts exist in Wichita, what better program than the extensions to teach holistically about food: horticulture (growing your own food), eating healthy and nutritiously, helping families to do projects together and so much more! I am excited about the possibilities of helping to grow current programs with new audiences.

What are your experiences with adult and/or youth educational programs, including those provided by K-State Research and Extension?

The first time I heard of programming that the K-State Extension offered was your mowing class. I worked at Lynette Woodard at the time and helped set up. The turnout for the event was amazing and the kids really loved learning from the professionals that were speaking. What goals do you envision for Extension?

The goals I see for the extension office is having more free classes in areas where kids wouldn't usually get the chance. Also working with every rec center in Wichita to offer programming because each area is different.
