Sedgwick County 4-H: Where Youth and Families Grow Together and Get "Beyond Ready"

In today's rapidly changing world, children and families are looking for opportunities that build confidence, cultivate purpose, and prepare youth not only for school and jobs, but for life. That's exactly what the Kansas 4-H Program in Sedgwick County offers through the club-based, hands-on

experience of 4-H. This year, the national 4-H organization launched the "Beyond Ready" initiative, signaling how 4-H helps youth go well beyond basic preparation, into leadership, community engagement, resilience, and lifelong learning.

Why join 4-H?

Research shows that youth who participate in high-quality 4-H programs are more likely to succeed academically, volunteer in their communities, lead teams and projects, and navigate life transitions with confidence. In Sedgwick County, 4-H helps youth discover their "spark"—whether that is robotics, animals, gardening, public speaking, sewing, or entrepreneurship—and supports them in belonging to a community of peers and adult mentors who believe in them.

FAMILY LIFE

When Nothing Feels Enough

In the digital era, both parents and children are exposed to a constant stream of comparisons. Social media showcases idealized images of families, academic achievements, or lifestyles that rarely reflect everyday reality. This phenomenon can leave parents with the sense that "nothing I do will ever be enough," a concept that psychological research links to learned helplessness or a feeling of impotence. When this perception persists, it can undermine



self-esteem, emotional well-being, and the parent-child relationship. Neuroscience studies point out that the human brain is not designed to process the information overload and comparisons imposed by the virtual world. For children and adolescents, growing up in this environment can mean constant pressure to meet unrealistic standards. When parents also feel unable to meet expectations, a cycle of frustration develops that spills over into family dynamics.



Kansas Seasonal Local Food

Items are organized based on when they are generally available fresh at your local farmers market, roadside stand, U-pick or CSA program. Local climate and growing practices may alter these seasons and harvesting windows.



Eat with the Seasons: Supporting Local Farmers All Winter Long

As summer farmers markets wrap up for the year, Sedgwick County residents still have plenty of ways to enjoy locally grown food through the colder months. The Kansas State University Extension Local Foods Systems program has developed a new seasonal food guide that highlights the produce available in Kansas throughout the year — reminding us that local eating doesn't stop when the weather cools.

The chart outlines what's in season each month, from the familiar summer favorites like tomatoes and sweet corn to hearty winter crops such as carrots, squash, and turnips. Root vegetables, stored apples, and winter greens like kale and spinach continue to thrive well past the first frost, offering fresh options long after the summer markets have closed.

Across Sedgwick County, winter markets and farm stands are extending the growing season with the help of high tunnels and greenhouses. These season-extension structures enable local growers to bring fresh, Kansas-grown produce to the community throughout the year, including during the winter months.

Buying from local producers year-round helps strengthen Sedgwick County's local food system and supports farm families who keep fresh food available in every season. Choosing local first also means fresher flavor, shorter supply chains, and a direct investment in the community's economy and sustainability.

Even when temperatures drop, our local growers continue to work — and our community can continue to enjoy the taste of Kansas throughout every season.

Give the Gift of Health this Holiday Season

For many of us, Thanksgiving marks the start of the season

of giving. If donating to a local food pantry is on your to-do list, consider giving the gift of health by choosing nutrient-rich, nonperishable food items this year. Here are some healthy donation ideas to help families enjoy nourishing meals throughout the holidays and beyond:



Fruit

- Canned fruit packed in water or 100% juice
- Dried fruit
- 100% fruit juice

Vegetables

- Low-sodium or no-salt-added canned vegetables
- Low-sodium soups

Grains

 Whole-grain crackers, brown rice, whole-grain pasta, oatmeal, or whole-grain breakfast cereal

Protein

- Canned or dried beans (no-salt-added or low-sodium) such as kidney, navy, pinto, garbanzo, great northern, or black beans
- Lentils
- Canned tuna, salmon, or chicken (water-packed)
- Unsalted nuts such as walnuts, pecans, peanuts, or almonds
- Nut butter

Dairy

Nonfat dry milk, evaporated milk, or shelf-stable milk


